Most of the very old maps that still exist today were made in Europe, because Europeans often printed hundreds or thousands of copies of their maps to sell, making it more likely that some survived over time. It is important to remember that these maps have a European perspective. Some important dates and time periods in European History that these maps reflect are:

- **Middle Ages**: A time when Europeans knew little about the outside world, except from what they read in old Greek and Roman books. The Catholic Church was the center of education.
- **1492-1493**: Christopher Columbus sails to the New World. Europeans begin to colonize (take land and resources from) North and South America very soon after.
- **Renaissance**: Towards the very end of the Middle Ages, Europeans became obsessed with the art and mythology of the Greeks and Romans. This period of time (from the 1300s through the 1600s) is called the "Renaissance" which means "rebirth."
- **Scientific Revolution**: During the 1600s (and part of the 1500s and 1700s), European scholars valued science and worked to learn more about the world.
- **1633**: Galileo is arrested by the Catholic church for teaching that the Earth revolves around the sun and that the Earth's rotation is what makes the sun rise and set.
